Its **magnificence** is revealed through its deeds. The ultimate conception of the spirit naturally accomplishes vast vows and great undertakings. It does not think small. It is concerned with the liberation of countless beings and the purification of entire realms of experience.

Its **enthusiasm** is the fire that never dies. Even when facing ordeals that stretch across eons, the spiritual genius does not tire. There is a boundless willingness to continue, to endure, to deepen. The effort does not feel forced; it feels inevitable.
